# WILD LIFE

- **“Wildlife”** includes any animal, aquatic or land vegetation which forms part of any habitat.
- **Wildlife** traditionally refers to undomesticated animal species, but has come to include all organisms that grow or live wild in an area without being introduced by humans.
- Wildlife can be found in all ecosystems.
- Deserts, forests, plains, grasslands and other areas including the most developed urban areas, all have distinct forms of wildlife.

# WILD LIFE PROTECTION ACT, 1972



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- ▶ The Wildlife Protection Act, 1972 is an Act of the Parliament of India enacted on 9<sup>th</sup> September, 1972.
- ▶ The act provides for the protection of wild animals, birds and plants and matters connected with them, with a view to ensure the ecological and environmental security of India.
- ▶ It extends to the whole of India, except the State of Jammu and Kashmir which has its own wildlife act.





# History Of Wildlife Protection Act

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- On 21<sup>st</sup> August 1972, the Wildlife Protection Act was passed. This act was later implemented on 9<sup>th</sup> September 1972.
- Laws related to wildlife have been a part of our history.
- The oldest law to protected wildlife and nature can be found in the 3<sup>rd</sup> century BC when Ashoka , the king of Magadha put in place a law to preserve wildlife and environment.
- The first codified law for the protection of wildlife was introduced by the British in 1887, which enacted the Wild Birds Protection Act 1887.
- In 1912, the British again passed a new law called the Wild Birds and Animals protection Act 1912, which in the long run was unable to protect the wild birds and animals.
- In 1935, the act of 1912 was amended by the Wild Birds and Animals Protection (Amendment) Act 1935.
- The struggle for independence saw the issue of wildlife protection shifted to the back burner, but shortly after independence it was ultimately not until 1960 that the issue of diminishing wildlife came to the forefront again.



- The Wildlife Protection Act 1972 is essentially an Indian Legislation executed by the Indian Parliament for the protection of various species of plants and animals.
- The Wildlife Protection Act is divided under 6 schedules which provide different degrees of protection.
- Schedule 1 and part 2 of schedule 2 provide complete protection and any violation under these calls for highest punishment.
- Species mentioned in schedule 3 and 4 are also protected, but the penalty associated with violation is much less.
- Schedule 5 includes animals which may be hunted and plants listed under.
- Schedule 6 are forbidden from being cultivated or planted.
- In 2002 an amendment in the Wildlife Protection Act of 1972 was made.



- This act known as the Wildlife (Protection) Amendment Act 2002.
- This amendment came into force in January 2003 and under it, punishment for defaulters is harsher.
- Under this amendment if one is caught in the process of trade of animal trophies and other articles derived from wild animals they will be subject to three years of imprisonment and/or a fine of Rs. 25,000.

- Every manufacturer of, or dealer in, animal article or every dealer in captive animals, trophies, or uncured trophies, or every taxidermist shall, within fifteen days from the commencement of Wildlife (Protection) Act, 1972, declare his stock of animal article, captive animal, trophies, and uncured trophies, as the case may be, as on the date of such declaration to the Chief Wildlife Warden in the form of Declaration.

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## Consideration) Rules, 1983

G.S.R. 328 (E), dated 13th April, 1983

► For the purposes of granting a licence referred to in sub-section (1) of Sec 44 of the Act, the Chief Wildlife Warden or the authorised officer, as the case may be, shall in addition to the matters specified in Cf.(b) of sub-section(4) of that section, have regard to the following other matters, namely

(i) Capacity of the applicant to handle the business concerned with reference to facilities, equipment, and suitability of the premises for such business;

(ii) The source and the manner in which the supplies for the business concerned would be obtained;

(iii) Number of licences for the relevant business already in existence in the area concerned;

(iv) Implications which the grant of such licence would have on the hunting or trade of the wild animals concerned.

► Provided that no such shall be granted if the said implications relate to any wild animal specified in Sch. I or part 11 of Sch. II to the Act, except with the previous consultation of the Central Government.

**(ii)** The Chief Wildlife Warden of the concerned State Govt./Union Territory, or

**(iii)** Any authorised officer of State Government/Union Territory.





## Licensee) Rules, 1995

G.S.R. 349 (E), dated 18th April, 1995

- (2) No licensee shall acquire, purchase or receive any specified plant or part or derivative thereof from any person other than a licensed dealer in specified plants or a cultivator having a license for cultivation of specified plants under the Act.
- (3) Licensee shall keep the stock of specified plants so purchased by him only in the premises approved by the Chief Wildlife Warden of the State.

# Penalties Under Wildlife (Protection) Act, 1972



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**(1)** Any person who [contravenes any provisions of this Act or any rule or order made thereunder or who commits a breach of any of the conditions of any licence or permit granted under this Act, shall be guilty of an offence against this Act, and shall, on conviction, be punishable with imprisonment for a term which may extend to [3 years] or with fine which may extend to [25000 rupees] or with both.

- Provided that where the offence committed is in relation to any animal specified in Scheduled I or Part 11 of Sch.11, or meat of any such animal, animal article, trophy, or uncurled trophy derived from such animal or where offence [relates to hunting in, or altering the boundaries of] a sanctuary or a National Park, such offence shall be punishable with imprisonment for a term which shall not be less than [1 year] but may extend to 6 years and also with fine which shall not be less than [5000 rupees].
- [Provided further that in the case of a second or subsequent offence of the nature mentioned in this sub-section, the term or imprisonment may extend to 6 years and shall not be less than 2 years and the amount of fine shall not be less than 10,000 rupees.]



**(2)** When any person is convicted of an offence against this Act, the Court trying the offence may order that any captive animal, wild animal, animal article, trophy, [uncured trophy, meat, ivory imported into India or an article made from such ivory, any specified plant or part or derivative thereof] in respect of which the offence has been committed, any trap, tool, vehicle, vessel, or weapon used in the commission of the said offence be forfeited to the State Government and that any licence or permit, held by such person under the provisions of this Act, be cancelled.

**(3)** Such cancellation of licence or permit or such forfeiture shall be in addition to any other punishment that may be awarded for such offence.

**(4)** Where any person is convicted of an offence against this Act, the court may direct that the licence, if any, granted to such person under the Arms Act, 1959 (54 of 1959) for possession of any arm with which an offence against this Act has been committed, shall be cancelled, and that such person shall not be eligible for a licence under the Arms Act, 1959, for a period of 5 years from the date of conviction.

**(5)** Nothing contained in section 360 of the Code of Criminal Procedure, 1973 (2 of 1974) or in the Probation of offenders Act, 1958 (20 of 1958) shall apply to a person convicted of an offence with respect to hunting in a sanctuary or a National Park or of an offence against any provision of Chapter VA unless such person is under 18 years of age.

# Protected Areas Network



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- ▶ Protected areas are those in which human occupation or at least the exploitation of resources is limited.
- ▶ The definition that has been widely accepted across regional and global frameworks has been provided by the International Union for Conservation of Nature (IUCN) in its categorization guidelines for protected areas.
- ▶ There are several kinds of protected areas, which vary by level of protection depending on the enabling laws of each country or the regulations of the international organizations involved.

# Protected Area Network (PAN)

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## **National Park:**

- An area, whether within a sanctuary or not, can be notified by the state government to be constituted as a National Park.
- By reason of its ecological, faunal, floral, geomorphological, or zoological association or importance, needed to for the purpose of protecting or developing wildlife there in or its environment.
- No human activity is permitted inside the national park except for the ones permitted by the Chief Wildlife Warden of the state under the conditions given in Chapter IV, WPA 1972.



- Any area other than area comprised with any reserve forest or the territorial waters can be notified by the State Government to constitute as a sanctuary if such area is of adequate ecological, fauna, floral, geomorphological, natural.
- Zoological significance, for the purpose of protecting, propagating or developing wildlife or its environment. Some restricted human activities are allowed inside the Sanctuary area.



- A Marine Protected Area (MPA) is essentially a space in the ocean where human activities are more strictly regulated than the surrounding waters - similar to parks we have on land.
- Marine Protected Areas (MPA) are protected areas of seas, oceans, estuaries or large lakes.
- Marine protected areas span a range of habitats, including the open ocean, coastal areas, inter-tidal zones, estuaries, and the Great Lakes.
- These places are given special protections for natural or historic marine resources by local, state, territorial, native, regional, or national authorities.
- There are 25 MPAs in Peninsular India and more 106 MPAs in the country's islands.



- Marine Protected Areas cover different types of protection. Some are “no-take zones or protected zones” that are essential to enable fish stocks to recover while others allow multiple use of their resources.
- **Marine National Park:** A Marine Park is a park consisting of an area of sea sometimes protected for recreational use, but more often set aside to preserve a specific habitat and ensure the ecosystem is sustained for the organisms that exist there.
  - Most marine parks are designated by governments.
- **Marine Sanctuary:** A marine sanctuary is a general type of marine protected area (MPA). An MPA is a section of the ocean where a government has placed limits on human activity.
  - Different types of MPAs allow different types of activities, such as scientific research, recreation, or commercial fishing.

## Conservation Reserves

- Conservation Reserves can be declared by the State Governments in any area owned by the Government, particularly the areas adjacent to National Parks and Sanctuaries and those areas which link one Protected Area with another.

## Community Reserves

- Some communities protect any private or community land not comprised within a National Park, Sanctuaries or a Conservation Reserve as a “Community Reserve” for protecting fauna, flora and traditional or cultural values and practices.
- These protected area categories were first introduced in the Wildlife (Protection) Amendment Act of 2002 – the amendment to the Wildlife Protection Act of 1972.
- These categories were added because of reduced protection in and around existing or proposed protected areas due to private ownership of land, and land use.

# Biosphere Reserves in India



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- The Indian government has also established Biosphere reserves, which protect larger areas of natural habitat, and often include one or more national parks and/or preserves, along with buffer zones that are open to limited economic activities.
- Biosphere reserves are sites established by countries and recognized under UNESCO's Man and the Biosphere (MaB) Programme.
- The programme of Biosphere Reserve was initiated by UNESCO in 1971.
- Presently, there are 18 notified Biosphere Reserves in India.
- A Biosphere reserve is divided into 3 zones:
  - **Core Zone:** Which is strongly protected for the conservation of biological diversity- to make sure that different types of plants and animals are safe from human impact.
  - **Buffer Zone:** Surrounds the Core Zones and provides a space for environmental research, recreation, and tourism.
  - **Transition Zone:** This area is for local communities that have a hand in managing the resources of the area through farming, fisheries, and other non-governmental activities.

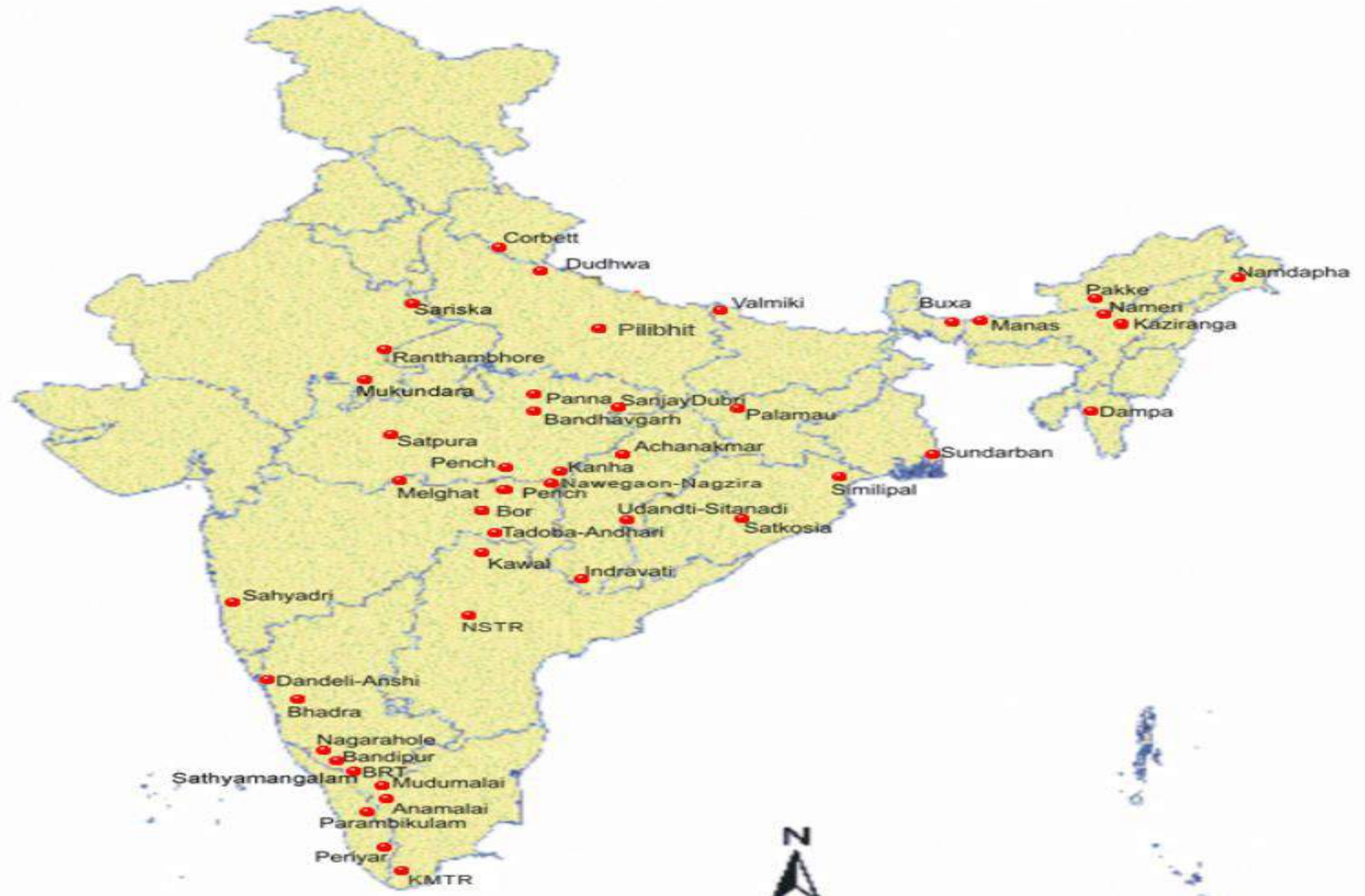


- Certain national parks and wildlife sanctuaries which support a good tiger population have been re-designated as tiger reserves, and these PAs enjoy a special status with the highest level of protection.
- Project Tiger was launched by the Government of India in the year 1973 to save the endangered species of tiger in the country.
- Starting from 9 reserves in 1973-2016 the number is grown up to 50.
- Which is administrated by the National Tiger Conservation Authority (NTCA).
- India is home to 70% of tiger in the world.
- In 2006, there were 1411 tiger which increased to 1706 in 2010 and 2226 in 2014.
- The total number of wild tigers ha risen to 3890 in 2016 according to World Wildlife Fund and Global Tiger Forum.

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- ▶ Project Elephant was launched by the Government of India in the year 1992 as a centrally Sponsored Scheme with following objectives:
  1. To protect elephant, their habitat & corridors
  2. To address issues of man-animal conflict
  3. Welfare of captive elephants
- ▶ The Indian elephant *Elephas maximus* occurs in the central and southern Western Ghats, North-east India, eastern India and northern India and in some parts of southern peninsular India.
- ▶ It is included in Schedule I of the Indian Wildlife (Protection) Act, 1972 and in Appendix I of the Convention on International Trade in Endangered Species of Flora and Fauna.
- ▶ It occurs in 16 states in the country and is showing an increasing trend across its distributional range. Its population in 2007 was estimated to be in the range from 27,657 to 27,682, whereas in 2012 the population was estimated to be between 27,785 and 31,368.

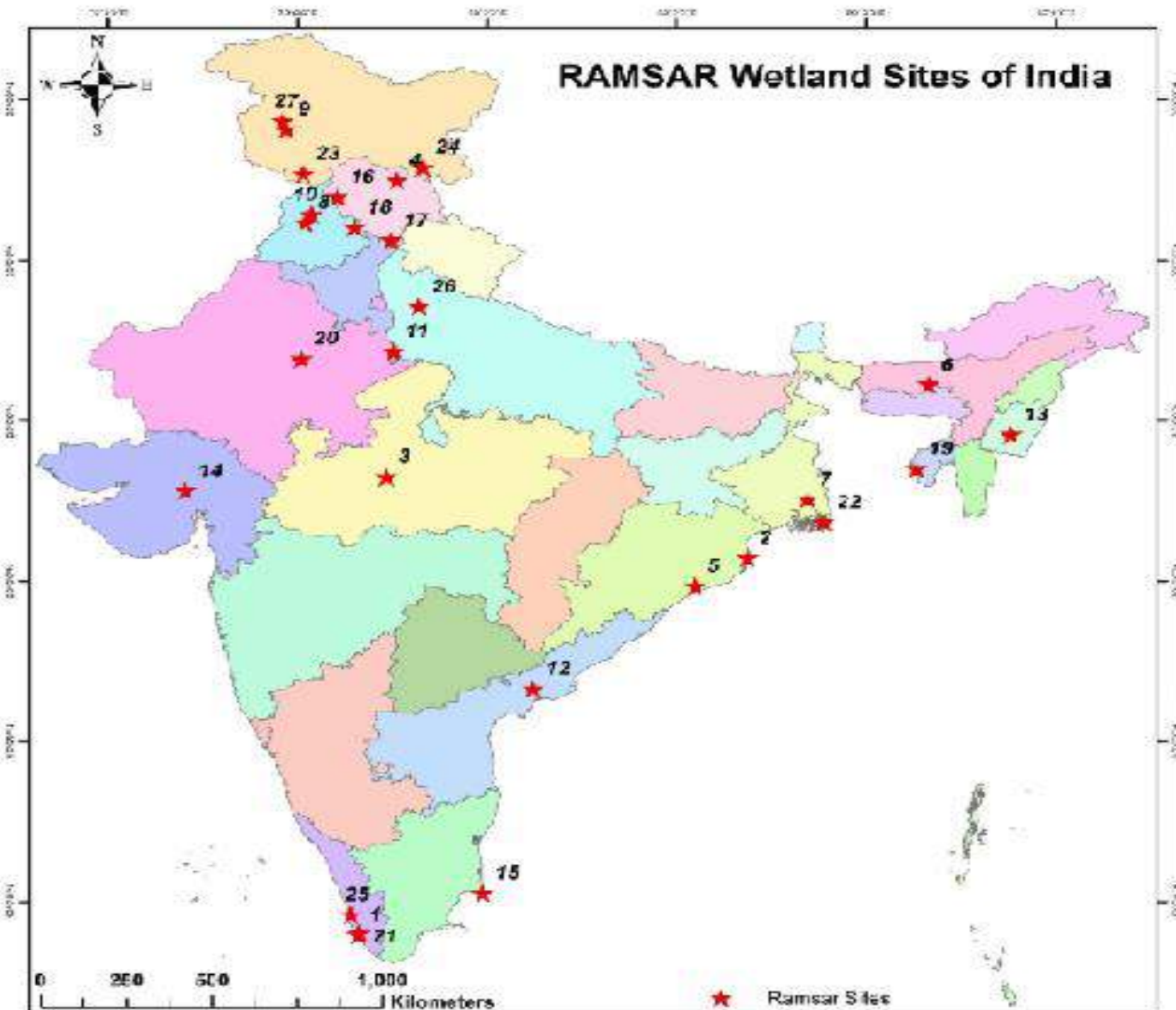

## **Wildlife Clearance:**

- Wildlife Clearance is a clearance or permission required as per Supreme Court order to establish any industry or development projects within 10 kms radius of any protected area from NBWL MoEF&CC New Delhi. If Protected area under Wildlife Protection Act, 1972 has its eco sensitive zone, then Wildlife Clearance is not required. The objective of Wildlife Clearance is to protect the wildlife of protected area.

## **Applicant:**

- Any person or agency is going to establish industry or other developmental activities or any other non- forestry activities within and 10 kms from any National Protected Area Network(PAN), can apply for wildlife clearance.

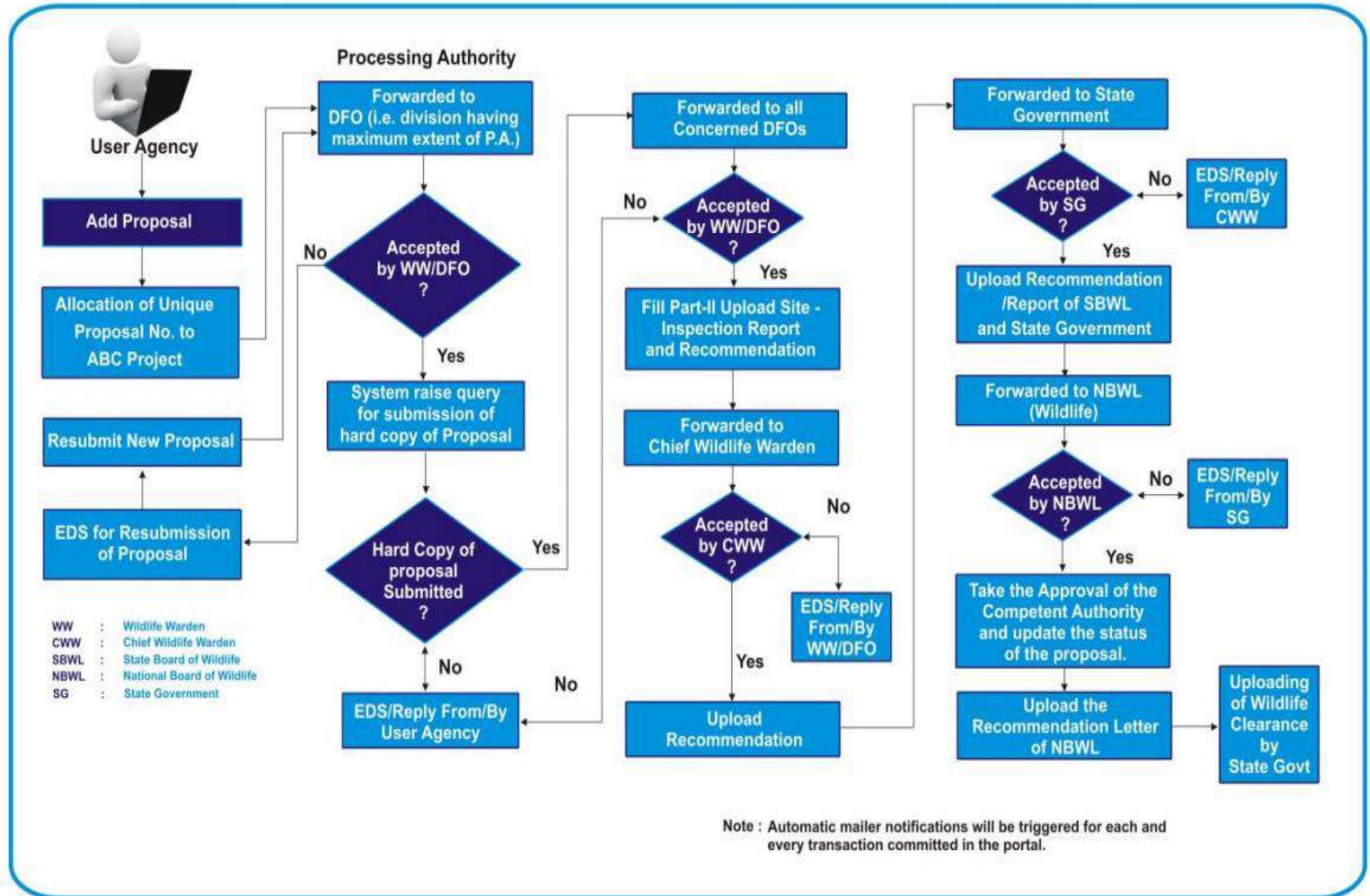
- ▶ The User Agency has to login in the Ministry's portal <https://parivesh.nic.in> And fill up Part-I and Part-II and submit it. The application then automatically moves to the Divisional Forest Officer/Deputy Conservator of Forest/Park Manager of the concerned Protected Area.

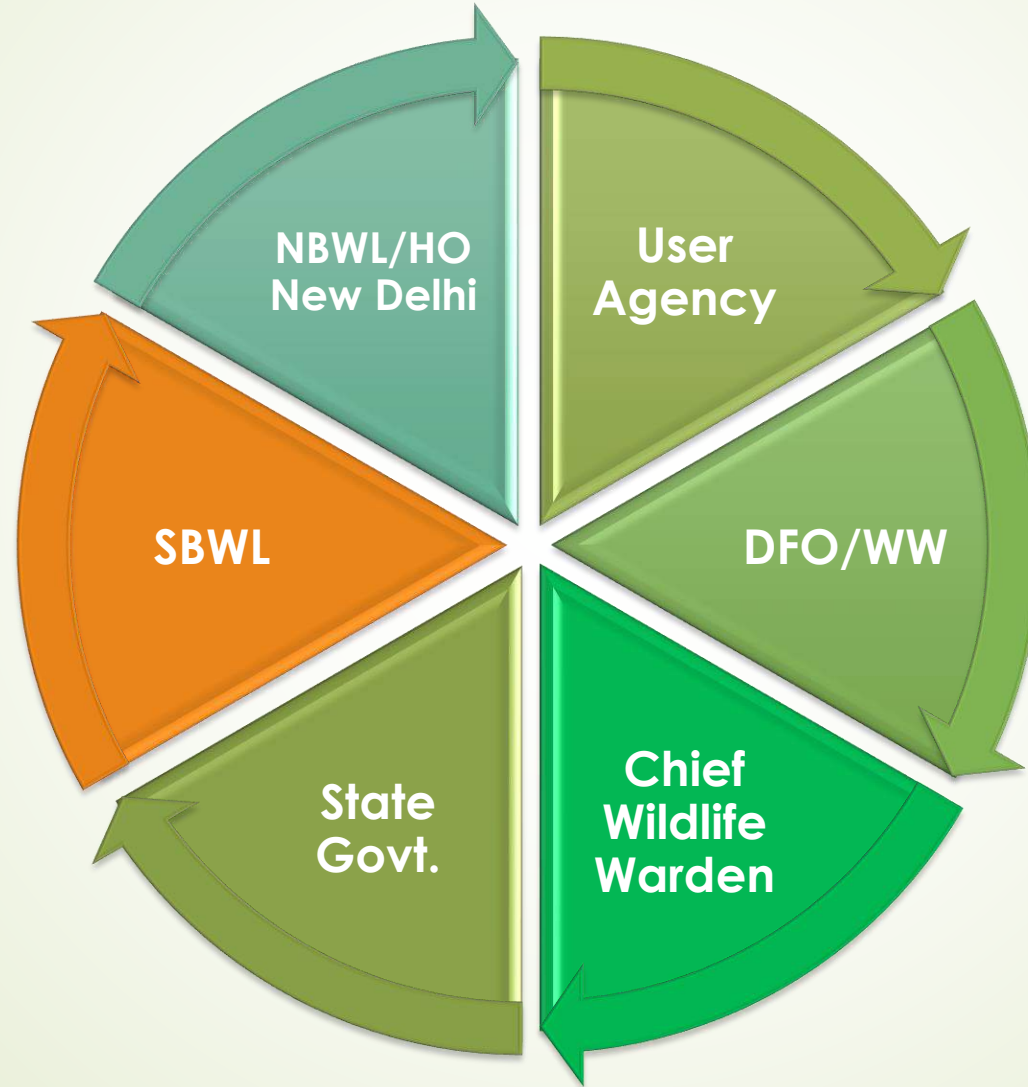

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# WORKFLOW FOR WILDLIFE CLEARANCE



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- The proposal submitted by U.A. will be forwarded to concerned DFO/Wild Life Warden (i.e. DFO of the division having maximum extent of the protected area needed for the project).
- DFO scrutinizes the proposal and sends an acceptance letter to User Agency.
- If all relevant documents are uploaded properly by U.A. If any document is missing or any other information is needed, DFO may ask U.A. to upload those missing information.
- Timeline will start only if DFO accepts the proposal.
- When, DFO sends the acceptance letter to U.A., proposal details are forwarded automatically to all the DFOs involved in the proposal for their necessary action.
- DFO can view the proposal after logging in to portal and can take print out (if needed) of the entire details and then process it.



- When, DFO uploads his/her recommendation and Site Inspection Reports on the portal, proposal details are forwarded automatically to concerned Chief Wildlife Warden (CWW) for the necessary action.
- CWW can view the proposal and recommendation of DFO after logging in to portal and can take print out (if needed) of the entire details and then process it.
- After that, he/she uploads his/her recommendation and Site Inspection report (if site inspection done) and the proposal will be forwarded to State Government level.
- After logging into the portal, State Government (SG) level user can view the proposal and recommendations of DFO and CWW and can take print out (if needed) of the entire details and then process it.
- After that, he/she uploads recommendation of State Board of Wildlife (SBWL) on the portal along with State Government report/recommendation.
- Once, these are uploaded on the portal, proposal is forwarded to Head Office (Wildlife), New Delhi.



- After receiving the proposal online from SG, the MoEFCC (HO) level user can view the proposal (Form-A submitted by U.A.) and recommendations of DFO, CWW, SBWL and State Government.
- HO (Wildlife) level user, then process it for the approval of the Competent Authority of MoEFCC.
- After taking approval of the Competent Authority, he/she has to update the status of the proposal and upload the recommendation letter of NBWL on the portal.



# TIME LINES TO BE FOLLOWED BY VARIOUS AGENCIES INVOLVED IN PROCESSING THE PROPOSALS



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1	<b>DFO/Wildlife Warden</b>	Initial scrutiny in <b>5 days</b> of receipt of the proposal  <b>30 days</b> after receipt of complete proposal for site inspection, consultation with Conservator of Forests/Chief Conservator of Forest. Principal Chief Conservator of Forests and forwarding to the Chief Wildlife Warden
2	<b>Chief Wildlife Warden</b>	<b>20 days</b> from receipt of proposal for scrutiny and recommendation to the State Government for placing before the State Board for Wildlife.



3	<b>Consultation with State Board for Wildlife and recommendation of State Government</b>	The activity involves decision of the State Government, consultation with State Board for Wildlife and thereafter, recommendation of State Government to Ministry of Environment, Forest and Climate Change enclosing the copy of the minutes of the State Board for Wildlife. Therefore, this stage may take up to <b>90 days (3 months)</b> , as the State Board for Wildlife is chaired by Hon'ble Chief Minister.
4	<b>Ministry of Environment, Forest and Climate Change</b>	Initial scrutiny in <b>5 days</b> of receipt of the proposal  <b>30 days</b> after receipt of complete proposal for Standing Committee of National Board for Wildlife.
5	<b>Consultation with Standing Committee of National Board for Wildlife</b>	Meetings of Standing Committee of National Board for Wildlife are ordinarily convened <b>once in 3 months</b> .
